Thursday, June 5, 2014 Annual Society Elections For The 2014-2015 Membership Year





The Quilt

I always wanted to make a quilt, but I have never had the time. As I thought about this, in fact I do have a quilt, but it is not made of fabric. I have documents, pictures, journals and letters. These are my quilt pieces, so now I am making a quilt of them.

To start, there's a picture of my Papa, Heinrich Janzen, first-born in the United States in Mt. Lake, Minnesota, in 1878. His father, Heinrich C. Janzen brought his family from Schoenwiese, Ukraine, to the USA in 1877. They were Germans from Russia.

Then there's a picture of Mama, Susanna Dirks. Mama came with her Dirks family from Crimea in 1907. Then a picture of Tante Vothcha, (Aunt Voth), the lady who went to Julius Siemens' office to purchase the steamship tickets for their journey, followed by a picture of Julius Siemens himself. He was a land agent and promoter who helped bring Mennonites to this country. The Dirks family entered the country from Quebec, Canada. Mama was the only one who was healthy enough to enter the USA. Her father and two uncles had pink eye, a contagious disease, so they came later. The step-mother and other siblings came later because of sickness while at the port in England. Mama came on the train through Chicago and on to her destination, Ritzville, Washington. She could only speak German, but she was wearing a tag on her dress that gave her name and destination. Mama obtained a job at Julius Siemens' house as a maid. Julius's wife was Anna, a sister to Heinrich Janzen, my father. Both the Siemens and Janzen families were from Ukraine, and Germans from Russia.

Mama and Papa met when Papa came to visit his sister, and there are pictures of their marriage license, and a wedding picture with Mama wearing a white veil with flowers, but in a gray dress. They married in Ritzville, Washington, and established their residence on a farm in Warden, Washington.

Later Mama and Papa, Henry and Susanna, moved to a farm at what was then called Fairmead, California. They raised eight children in Madera, County, California, and there are pictures of the church and school. An explanation is given as to why the school's name was changed from Munich to Dixieland. The different names of the school are shown on my sister's report cards and mine. My report card is signed by a lady whose daughter became a TV actress. You still see her on reruns. Many more pictures show the early struggles on the farm. All of these pieces, or assets, make up my guilt. They were sewn together as an audible and visual story written on the computer. They needed a binding, backing and embellishments. Robin Egbert, my son, is a videographer. He finds cars on the internet to make the story interesting. The stork brings the babies, but with adult faces. He digitally sews on the binding, backing and embellishments for beauty. The song "Oh Susanna" plays softly in the background adding warmth and pace. In the finished product, there's my guilt, not made of cloth as you would expect, but a DVD made on my computer. It's titled JANZEN CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION 1912 -2012, and a copy has been donated to the GSSCC library and is available upon request from our library. Check it out; it's a good heartwarming story.

Passport Research in Ancestry.com

One of the frequently overlooked links on the Ancestry.com website is the passport section of the database. It took me a while to gather the courage to venture into this section of Ancestry, as I was routinely daunted by the frustrations of researching the passenger list data. Recently, however, after stumbling onto a passport for a member of my extended ancestral family, I have become an enthusiastic passport researcher.

I'd been searching for everything I could put my hands on about my great-grandfather, William Arthur, and his eleven siblings, who were all orphaned as children in 1867. Over a fifteen year period, these children were scattered from Ouebec to Scotland as they grew into adulthood. Luckily for me, some information had come down through the family, so at least, I knew the marriage partners of each one. After exhausting the obvious birth, marriage, death and census databases, I started checking into other categories of information. And while William Arthur evidently never applied for a passport or traveled abroad after moving to the United States, one of his children and one of his nieces did travel. This discovery reinforces the strategy of researching all the children and collateral relatives of one's ancestor.

I found my first hint to check the passport records from a perusal of possible links listed down the

right-hand side of the Ancestry page showing William Arthur's twin sister and her husband, who had an unusual surname. Clicking on the link took me to the Ancestry thumbnail page, which allowed me to access the digitized original passport application for William's niece, Vivian Behenna. From the first page of the document, I learned when and where Vivian was born, and that her father was deceased as of the date of the application. I learned where her father had been born. I learned that, by the age of 36, Vivian had already lived in France and England, and she listed the years she lived in those places, which enabled me to understand why I'd had so much trouble finding her mother on U.S. census returns. I also learned that Vivian worked for military intelligence in Washington, D.C., a highly unusual career for women in 1920. I was so excited about all this new information that I almost forgot to look at the subsequent pages of her application.

The second page described Vivian's appearance in great detail, and had a photo attached. The third page was the real find. Her mother, Kathleen, my great-grandfather's twin sister, signed an affidavit attesting to Vivian's date and place of birth. I was able to see Kathleen's firm slanted penmanship where she signed her name and described herself as an artist and author. She also listed her residence address. The fourth page consisted of a letter from Vivian's employer detailing that she worked as a stenographer to the military attaché, who was being stationed in Stockholm, Sweden. Two years later, Vivian received a new passport in connection with her travel to Asia, where she served as secretary to the attaché for the Department of Commerce in Peking, China.

William Arthur's eldest son, Harry Arthur, also applied for a passport, in 1916. The first page of Harry's application detailed his date and place of birth, and confirmed William's own birth in Helensburgh, Scotland. Harry's application also indicated that William had immigrated to the U.S. in 1880, and included information that he departed from Liverpool, England. The first page of the application also informed me that William became a naturalized citizen in approximately 1888, in Dakota Territory. I learned that Harry would be traveling to China in connection with his employment in railroad construction.

Just as for Vivian, the second page of Harry's application contained a detailed description of Harry's appearance, and a photograph. Page three of Harry's application consisted of a letter from his employer. The treasure trove of this passport application, however, was found on page four. In a handwritten page signed by both of my greatgrandparents, they not only attested under oath to the date and place of Harry's birth, which had occurred before official records were kept in Dakota, but they also added that "nor were there any public record of our marriage in said state, nor of any marriage or birth of any citizen in said state." For years, I had been looking for an official marriage document for my great-grandparents, without success. Finally, I knew why it could not be found - because it didn't exist!

Like Vivian, Harry got another passport later, in 1923. This second application contained much of the same information as the first, but also contained some new information. The second application stated that Harry had lived in Canada for a year in the late 1890s, that his family had moved from Atlantic to Quincy, Massachusetts, and that Harry planned to travel to Brazil, Argentina and Uruguay on business. The third page of Harry's 1923 application contained William Arthur's signed affidavit that he was a naturalized citizen, and that he resided at Quincy, Massachusetts. I further learned that Harry had become president of his own New York company.

Here are my suggested research strategies:

(1) Research all siblings and all children of your ancestors for possible passport applications, especially if you suspect they traveled abroad for business or to visit relatives in other countries (and you will find possible clues in the census records under the column detailing a person's occupation and/or foreign place of birth, or if a person had foreign-born parents);

(2) Be sure to look at all pages of the passport application; sometimes the most important or helpful information will be on the latter pages;

(3) Look for possible subsequent passport applications for the same individual; subsequent applications may contain new information;

(4) Then research departure and arrival passenger lists that match up with the travel itinerary listed on the passport application.

Here's how to easily access Ancestry's passport database:

(1) From the Ancestry home page, click on the "Search" tab located on the upper toolbar, then click on "Immigration and Travel;"

(2) From the "Immigration and Travel" page, click on the "Border Crossings and Passports" link in the menu box found on the upper right-hand side of the page (this box is entitled "Narrow by Category");

(3) From the "Narrow by Category" page, click on the "U. S. Passport Applications, 1795-1925" link in the menu box found on the upper right-hand side of the page (this box is entitled "Featured Data Collections");

(4) Now, fill in the search box with at least the first and last name, and gender, of your ancestor. Remember to use married surnames for married women. If you are certain about the spelling of your applicant's last name, slide the bar to the right for "exact" next to the line for your applicant's surname in order to narrow down the hit list.
